Indigenous Foods & Medicines Workshop

A four-day Indigenous Foods & Medicines Workshop was led by Food Sovereignty Intern Terrance Scott, with support from his auntie Christine George, T'Sou-ke's Garden Coordinator. The workshop was part of the Land, Water, Food Systems Sowing Food Sovereign Futures youth program.

Participants spent two days out in the territory harvesting traditional foods and medicines. Together, they gathered multiple types of blueberries, red huckleberries, and black caps, and searched for other foods including cranberries. The final two days were spent in the T'Sou-ke Health Centre kitchen, where the group made jam and shared meals together.

The workshop welcomed T'Sou-ke Nation staff, including Councillor Bonnie Hill, as well as youth participants and community members. These shared experiences created opportunities for deepened relationships, cross-generational learning, and reconnection with traditional harvesting practices.

We thank T'Sou-ke Nation for welcoming us into their community and territory and are grateful for the opportunity to connect with one another.

Nation-to-Nation Housing and Infrastructure Networking Tour

On June 18, we had the privilege of joining with the Tsawwassen First Nation for a NmTC Nation-to-Nation Housing and Infrastructure Networking Tour. This meaningful gathering brought together Member Nations to strengthen relationships and share knowledge on critical housing and infrastructure priorities.

Highlights included insightful presentations, a shared lunch at TFN's beautiful new Elders Centre, and a guided shuttle tour of the community — all underscoring the importance of collaboration, respect, and shared learning.

We are grateful to be part of these vital conversations and deeply thank Tsawwassen First Nation for welcoming us to their territory and community.



Housing – Building Official Internship

Great news! TSU has secured 100% of the funding (\$79,000) for our fully-paid internship to train and certify new Indigenous Building Officials. Funding was received from Indigenous Services Canada (\$49,000) and the McConnel Foundation (\$25,000). The internship is anticipated to begin in late summer or early fall 2025.

Building Permit Guide – Tla’amin Nation

The TSU team prepared a new comprehensive Building Permit Guide for use by both administrators and the Tla’amin citizens. This document can be referenced by any Member Nation for the development of their own guide.

Infrastructure – Malahat Nation

The TSU Team is providing technical engineering support to Malahat Nation including: development approval reviews, the Oliphant Dam upgrade works, and general engineering and contract administration support for the re-construction of Oliphant Dam.

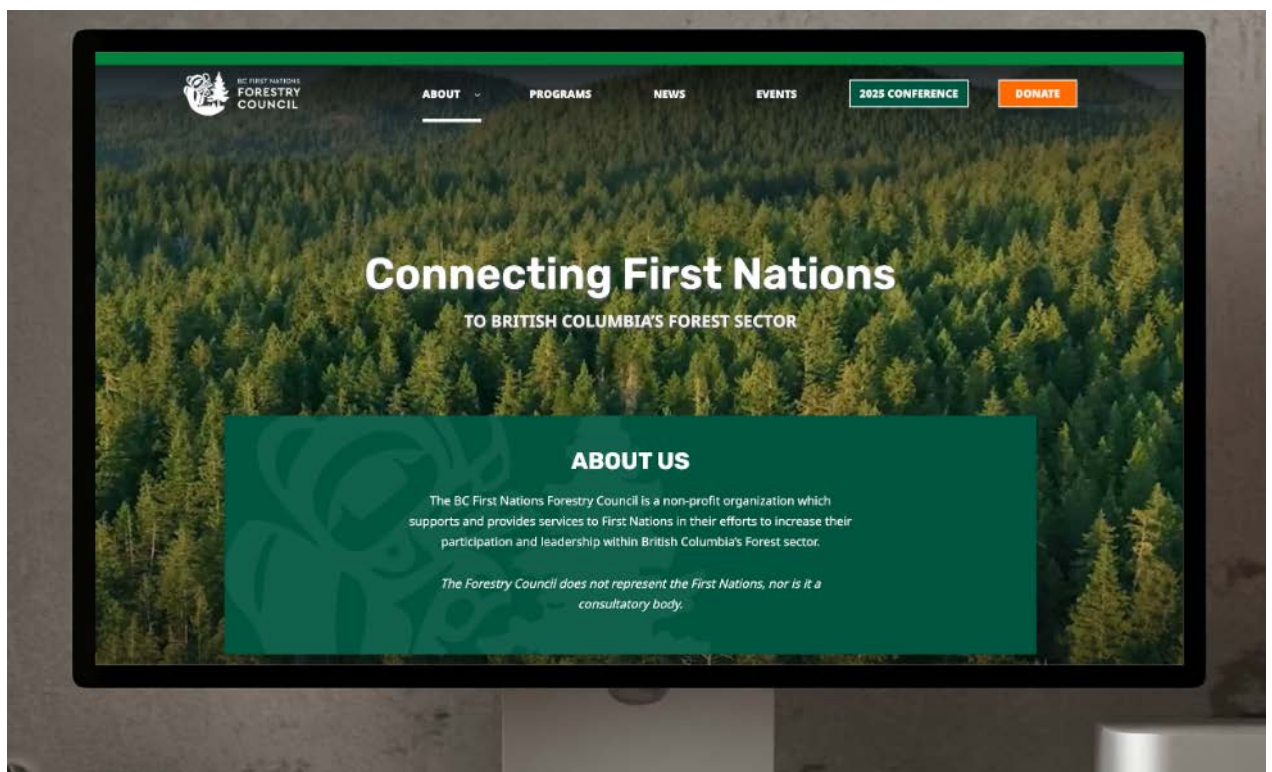
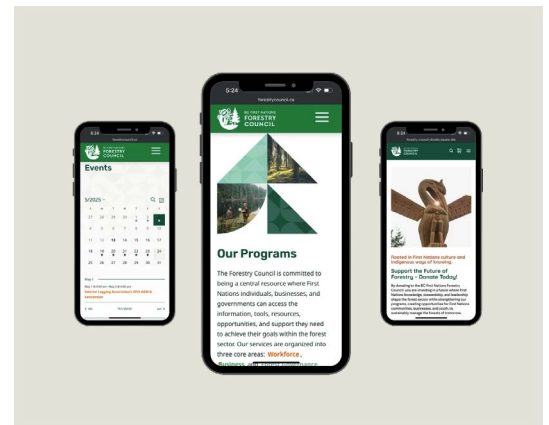
BC First Nations Forestry Council

Honouring the spirit of Truth and Reconciliation, this year's Orange Shirt Day apparel was designed by Master Carver Jackson Robertson. His Tribal affiliation is the Tsawataineuk First Nation from Kingcome Inlet, BC but he lived most of his life in Nanaimo.

Jackson's carving, Kwakwaka'wakw Sisiutl with Dzunukwa, was digitized for this year's Orange Shirt. As interpreted, the Sisiutl crest is meant to Protect Every Child.

A little more about Jackson:

Jackson Ford Robertson is a fifth-generation carver. After 50 years and thousands of carvings, he is considered a Master Carver and has influenced many up-and-coming artists.

From an early age, Jackson learned to carve from his uncles—Alfred Robertson, the late Samson Robertson, and David Robertson—all of whom were accomplished carvers whose work was highly sought after. By the age of 14, Jackson was already creating masks, bowls, talking sticks, and plaques.

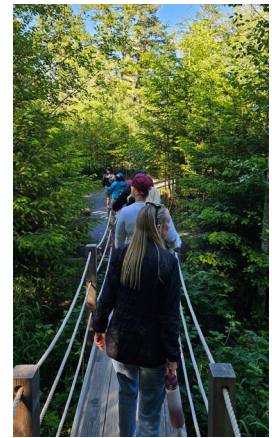
His carvings have appeared in galleries across Vancouver and Vancouver Island. Over the years, he found his niche in carving legends from his culture and Potlatch traditions. His style evolved into a unique blend of classic and contemporary—creative, bold, and abstract.
